Garden pond perils

Remove and destroy these yellow-flowered invasive plants from your pond.



Water poppy (Hydrocleys nymphoides)

NEM: BA Category 1b – remove and destroy
Free-floating perennial with long, trailing stems and oval-shaped
leaves. Flowers are light yellow with a red and brown centre.



Yellow flag (Iris pseudacorus)

NEM: BA Category 1a – remove and destroy
This is an herbaceous plant 1-1,5 m high with narrow, strap-like
leaves. The bright yellow flowers have three large downward facing
petals. Numerous pale brown seeds develop in a dry capsule. It
thrives in very wet conditions and can quickly overrun indigenous

What can you do to prevent the spread of invasive species?

Yellow water lily (Nymphaea mexicana)

NEM: BA Category 1b – remove and destroy
A rooted aquatic plant with round to oval floating leaves, split at
the point where it attaches to the stem. They have fragrant flowers
with pointed petals. These plants have escaped from ornamental
ponds in gardens and have become invasive in several dams and
rivers



Fringed water lily (Nymphoides peltata)

NEM: BA Category 1a – remove and destroy
Free-floating water plant with heart-shaped leaves. The flowers
protrude several centimetres above the water's surface and have
five large petals with distinctly fringed margins.
